## Announcement of the 1980 Shields Class National Championship Regatta

The Shields Class National Championship Regatta will be held at Edgartown, Martha's Vineyard, Mass. commencing with registration and sail measuring on Monday and Tuesday, September 8 and 9. A tune-up race will be held on Wednesday afternoon and will be followed by the National Association and Skippers' meetings that evening. The goal is to have two races each day for a total of six races. The Race Committee may on one day only conduct three races and will score the best five out of six.

The Regatta is sponsored by the Edgartown Yacht Club and Martha's Vineyard Fleet #8 aided by boats from Northern Mass. Bay Fleet #4, Narragansett Bay Fleet #9 and Buzzards Bay Fleet #10.

Both the Chairman of the Regatta Race Committee and the Chief Judge are USYRU appointed judges. In accordance with Rule 3.1(b) and the related prescription effective April 1, 1979, there will be no appeal and the judge's decisions will be final. Race instructions will be presented at the Skippers' Meeting.

Because of limited island facilities it is strongly recommended that participants bring sails, especially spinnakers, that



have been premeasured and conform to Shields By-laws.

As provided in the By-laws, yachts for the Regatta will be assigned to the contestants at random by means of a drawing and no competitor shall be allowed to use his own boat. Drawing for boats will be at the time of registration.

Only one mainsail, one jib and one spinnaker shall be used by a contestant, and those shall be the sails used by him/her in the qualifying races referred to above.

The number of persons aboard each yacht shall not be less than three. Each

yacht shall be required to carry throughout all races the number of persons on board at the start of the first race. Local crews may be available on request.

Boats available to contestants will be delivered in good condition with freshly scrubbed bottoms. Boats will not be allowed to be taken out of the water after 1700 Hours Wednesday, September 10. Prior to this time boat bottoms may not be sanded off without the owner's permission.

Skippers are responsible for all damage done to the borrowed boats. The boats must be returned to the owner in the same condition as received. Skippers should check their own liability insurance to make sure they are adequately covered.

All Fleet Secretaries will receive notification of the number of boats available to their fleet. Secretaries are asked to complete a Qualification Certificate indicating who will be competing in the National Regatta. It will be appreciated if this response is received by the Regatta Committee by August 27.

In order to race in the 1980 Championships, a Shields owner or charterer must have qualified in a substantial racing series of not less than five races conducted by his/her fleet this year, and he/she must have finished in the upper half of all yachts qualifying in such series.

The entry fee for the regatta will be \$100. Please make checks payable to: "The Shields National Association Regatta." Mail to: Commodore James H. Cannon, Edgartown Yacht Club, Edgartown, Mass. 02539.

The winds and waters of Martha's Vineyard are exciting in September. Edgartown itself is a charming resort community with a wide variety of inns, guest houses, sports facilities and shops. Lists of all facilities and maps are being sent to each fleet and participants. Because of the nature of our island, transportation by plane and ferry can be difficult. Schedules will be sent to participants and advance reservations are essential. Arrangements will be made to meet incoming participants.


### **President's Letter** Michael R. Deland

Not only would this greatly increase the safety of our boats, but as the many of us who have already installed them can attest, it greatly simplifies "keeping her dry" around the race course. This is one of several changes to be recommended by the Technical Committee for approval at the upcoming Annual Meeting. Those of you who wish to proceed immediately should contact Gordon Goodwin at Cape Cod Ship who can provide information on the different pumps available and on installation procedures.

Your Officers continue to be active in improving the organization and communication details of the Class. This effort has been spearheaded by Treasurer Nick Baker. Among his accomplishments are: putting the "Bluebook" of





The Navy has authorized replacement of "Barbara" and action is now underway to procure a used Shields. The subject of boat survivability should be discussed again at the National Meeting. Rather than trying to make the Shields unsinkable, everyone should be fully aware that they will sink if filled. In the event of a knockdown, bailing must start at once. In fact, every time they take water, it should be removed immediately. Another survivability maneuver is to lower the mainsail in high winds and sail under jib only. The Shields sails well that way and is completely controllable. The only caution is to ease the backstay to prevent damage to the mast.

### Grand Rapids, Michigan.

Bob Ethridge (#47, "Spirit") of Grand Rapids, Michigan reports having located Shields #132 sailing at Holland, Michigan and says they now have three boats in that area. He is hopeful that, perhaps, someday they might be able to form a fleet in Michigan.
